Bartlett et al utes of the United States, Chapter Six, Title Thirty-two, and Filed for Record July leglislation supplemental thereto, there have been deposited 14th, 1911 at 9:40 in the General Land Office of the United States the Plat and o'clock A.M. Field Notes of Survey and the Certificate, No 1182, of the Reg-Richard Lawrence ister of the Land Office at Rapid City in the State of South Register of Deeds. Dakota accompained by other evidence whereby it appears that H.R. Bartlett Trustee For Arthur J. Monshan, William A. Gray, A.S. Gates, John F. McLaughlin, and Charles Stovens, did, on the twenty-sixth day of July, A.D. 1901, duly enter and pay for that certain mining claim or premises, known as the Fog lode mining claim, designated by the Surveyor-General as Lot No. 1377, embracing a portion of township five north of range two east, Black Hills worldian, in the Whitewood Mining District, in the County of Lawrence and State of South Dakota, in

the District of Lands subject to sale at Rapid City and bounded, described, and platted as follows, with magnetic variation fifteen degrees east,

Beginning at corner No. 1, a porykyy rock 8x9×24 inches marked 1F-1377, with mound of stone, from which U.S. locating monument No.31, bears south forty five degrees and fiftythree minutes east four thousand three hundred and thirteen and two tenths feet distant.

Thence first course, north twenty degrees and forty minutes east three hundred and six and seven tenths feet to corner No. 2, a porphyry rock SXSX26 inches, marked 2F- 1377, withmound of stone.

Thence, second course, north eighty-seven degrees and eleven minutes west one thousand four hundred and eighty-seven and four tenths feet to corner No. 3, a pine post five inches square, marked 5F- 1377 in mound of earth and rock.

Thence, third course, south twenty degrees and forty minutes west ninety-nine foeth point from which discovery shaft hears south sixty-two degrees and twenty-two minutes . east one hundred and thirty-one and seven tenths feet distant; ninety-nine and seven tenths fact to corner No. 4, a pine post five inches square marked 4F-1377 in mound of

Thence, fourth course, south two degrees and forty-four minutes wert one hundred and forty-nine and nine tenths feet to corner No. 5, a pine post seven inches square, marked 5F-1377, in mound of earth and rock.

Thence, fifth course, south eighty-five degrees and seventeen minutes east one thousand four hundred and twenty-four and five tenths feet to corner No.1, the place of beginning; said lot No. 1377 as above described, extending one thousand four hundred and eighty-one and seven tenths feet in length along said Fog vein or lode and containing nine acres and fifty-four thousandths of an acre of land, more or less.

MOW KNOW YE, That there is therefore hereby granted by the United States white the said H.R. Bartlett, Trustse for Arthur J. Monahan, William A. Grey, A.S. Gates, John F. McLaughlin and Charles Stevens.and to his successors and assigns the said mining premises bereinbefore described, and not expressly excepted from these presents, and all that portion of the said Fog vein, lode, or lodge, and of all other veins, lodes, and ledges, throughout their entire depth, the tops or apexes of which lie inside of the surface boundary lines of said granted premises in said Lot No. 1377 extended downward vertically elthough such veins, lodes, or ledges in their downward course may so far depart from e perpendiculer as to extend outside the vertical side lines of said premises:

Provided, That the right of possession to such outside parts of said veins, lodes, or ledges, shall be confined to such portions thereof as lie between vertical planes drawn downward through the end lines of said Lot No. 1377 so continued in their own direction that such planes will intersect such exterior parts of said veins, lodes, or lodges: And provided further, That nothing herein contained shall authorize the grantee herein to enter upon the surface of a claim owned or possessed by another.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said mining premises, together with all the rights, privilegos, issumities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging unto the said grantee above named and to his successors and assigns forever; subject neverless to the above-mentioned and to the following conditions and stipulations:

First That the premises hereby granted, with the execption of the surface, may be entered by by the proprietor of any other vein, lode, or ledge the top or apex of which lies outside of the boundary of said premises, should the same in its dip be found to penetrate, intersect, or extend into  $\frac{dt}{dt}$  said premises, for the purpose of extracting and removing the ore from such other vein, lode, or ledge.

Second. That the premises hereby granted shall be held subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufactuting, or other purposes, and rights to ditch es and reservoirs used in connection with such water right as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local laws, customs, and descisions of the courts. And there is reserved from the lands hereby granted, a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the lauthority of the United States.

Third. That in the absence of necessary leglislation by Congress, the Leglislature of South Dakota may provide rules for working the mining claim or premises hereby granted, involving easements, drainage, and other nacessary means to its complete developement.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF I, Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
